


# CURAC 2019 Conference at Guelph By Ed Barbeau

The 2019 Annual Conference of the College and University Retirees
Associations of Canada took place at the University of Guelph from May 22 to
May 24. The speakers highlighted those areas that put Guelph in the vanguard
of research into important issues: food security and diet, the use of therapy
dogs, the biome of a healthy body, responses to climate change and population
growth, and sexuality at different stages of life. A local panel dealt with agefriendly communities, and we visited the library to learn about its archival
priorities. The banquet featured superb food at the centre in the Arboretum, a
400-odd acre park next to the campus.

Nine of the 63 delegates were from the University of Toronto, four representing UTFA and five from Senior College.

# Examining the Roles and Responsibilities of Research Assistants in Their Interactions with Research Participants in Vulnerable Circumstances: A Focus Group Study

Dr. Friedland, in collaboration Dr. Elizabeth Peter, ran a focus group study to examine the roles and responsibilities of research assistants in their interactions with research participants in vulnerable circumstances.

All research studies that involve human participants must undergo an ethics review. The purpose of the review is to ensure that participants are protected: that their dignity is respected, that concern is shown for their welfare, and that any decisions about participating are fully informed and autonomous (TCPS2, 2014). Concern about protecting participants is heightened when studies involve people considered to be in vulnerable circumstances. Read more.
